

The premise behind *Movie Subplots* is simple.

Movie Subplots highlights real world and historical situations that play a role in the choices that some men and women make in relation to their skills and abilities.

Many students do not have access to career counseling, according to Pathways to Prosperity, a Harvard Graduate School of Education study.

And experts such as author Richard Nelson Bolles point out that only 10 percent of the populations understand their actual abilities.

It is an issue that cuts across all socioeconomic, ages and gender groups.

That the general population is woefully undereducated about the concepts of skills and abilities is a credible argument.

Pop culture as a useful educational tool for honing research, writing and career exploration skills in small doses.

Simple activities and questions that focus on characters and their challenges trigger critical thinking and evaluation skills...and insights
